Notas gramaticales

p. 23: Spanish has a special upside-down question mark and exclamation mark, to be used at the beginning of a question or exclamatory sentence. Spanish also has a tilde over the letter N sometimes (Ñ/ñ), which makes the *ny* sound. An accent mark is also needed at times over the vowels to show which syllable is stressed.

p. 25: The pronoun **yo** means “I,” but it is not capitalized in Spanish, unless it’s at the beginning of a sentence. In Spanish, there are two different pronouns for “you.” The first is **tú**, which you use when talking to peers or friends. We will learn the other way in Chapter 4. In Spanish, speakers do not always say “yo” or “tú” in their sentences; it is often times implied.
